






One of the most significant speeches in literature is the one given in Hamlet by Polonius to his son Laertes who leaving for France. This moment is significant because Polonius's reveals his concern with appearances, reputation, and practical wisdom, while also setting up themes of honesty, self-knowledge, and the tension between seeming and being that run throughout the play. This scene is not just parental advice—it's Shakespeare embedding **themes of honesty, prudence, and self-knowledge** into the play's fabric. Polonius's words echo throughout the tragedy, reminding us that failing to be "true to oneself" leads to betrayal, corruption, and ultimately destruction.

Polonius' Advice to Laertes

Hamlet I, iii, 55-81

LORD POLONIUS:

Yet here, Laertes! aboard, aboard, for shame! The wind sits in the shoulder of your sail, And you are stay'd for. There; my blessing with thee! And these few precepts in thy memory See thou character. Give thy thoughts no tongue, Nor any unproportioned thought his act. Be thou familiar, but by no means vulgar. Those friends thou hast, and their adoption tried, Grapple them to thy soul with hoops of steel; But do not dull thy palm with entertainment Of each new-hatch'd, unfledged comrade. Beware Of entrance to a quarrel, but being in, Bear't that the opposed may beware of thee. Give every man thy ear, but few thy voice; Take each man's censure, but reserve thy judgment. Costly thy habit as thy purse can buy, But not express'd in fancy; rich, not gaudy; For the apparel oft proclaims the man, And they in France of the best rank and station Are of a most select and generous chief in that. Neither a borrower nor a lender be: For loan oft loses both itself and friend, And borrowing dulls the edge of husbandry. This above all: to thine ownself be true, And it must follow, as the night the day, Thou canst not then be false to any man.

Farewell: my blessing season this in thee!

Polonius's advice to Laertes in *Hamlet*—especially the line "This above all: to thine own self be true"—resonates strongly with the **tenets of Freemasonry**, which emphasize integrity, self-knowledge, prudence, and moral conduct. While Shakespeare predates organized Freemasonry as we know it, the values expressed in this speech align closely with Masonic principles of truth, virtue, and harmony

So What's a Rusty Trowel Program?

As with most things dis-use results in tarnish and perhaps even rust. So it goes with

Freemasonry, failure to attend results in forgetting and fear.

There are probably several thousand Freemasons in the Quad-City area that do not attend lodge and enjoy Masonic fellowship!

What's the cause? There really isn't just one, but some are:

- 1. Life changes, making the meeting night unavailable.
- 2. Lodge failed to deliver on its promises.
- 3. Moving to a new area and getting out of the "go to Lodge Habit".
- 4. Don't know where the Lodge is.
- 5. Fear of the Tyler's examination.
- 6. New to the jurisdiction and don't know the protocols.
- 7. Dues card is out of date.
- 8. Have a demit but don't know what to do with it.
- 9. Want to maintain current Lodge membership and are afraid we will push them into Aztlan Lodge membership.

The solutions to some of these can usually be resolved by having a variety of activities and education or discussion evenings on different days of the week. Some can be resolved by advertising who we are and where we are.

Several are a bit harder to deal with and that's where the Rusty Trowel Program comes in. The Rusty Trowel Program is designed to introduce Brothers sojourning in the area to the Lodge and our Brothers. It teaches them what they need to know to enjoy the lodge experience without the embarrassment of being unsure of the signs and other protocols unique to Arizona.

Perhaps the most important part of the Rusty Trowel program is the vetting of Brothers we don't know BEFORE the actual program. During the vetting process we validate dues cards, instruct Brothers on how to use their demits and answer any administrative questions that they may have. For these reasons we don't advertise the actual date of the program. Once the vetting is successfully completed we invite the Brother to attend.



THE LIBERAL ARTS/SCIENCES - ARITHMETIC



Arithmetic is the branch of mathematics that deals with numbers and the basic operations performed on them: addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division. It is the foundation of all higher mathematics and is used in everyday life for counting, calculating, and problem-solving. Arithmetic is the study of numerical operations and calculations. Arithmetic is the language of numbers and the first step into the world of mathematics.

How did the Study of Arithmetic Begin?

The study of arithmetic began with humanity's earliest attempts to count and record quantities, using tally marks, bones, and primitive numeral systems thousands of years ago.



• Prehistoric Counting Tools:

⇒ The **Lebombo bone** (44,000 BC) and the **Ishango bone** (20,000 BC) found in Africa are among the earliest artifacts showing tally marks used for counting.

• Ancient Civilizations:

- \Rightarrow **Mesopotamia (Babylonians)** developed positional number systems and used clay tablets for calculations around 2000 BC.
 - ⇒ **Egyptians** used hieroglyphic numerals for trade, construction, and astronomy.
 - ⇒ Chinese and Indian cultures independently created counting rods and decimal systems

Greek Contributions:

⇒ Greek mathematicians like **Euclid** and **Diophantus** formalized arithmetic as part of mathematical theory, moving beyond practical trade into abstract reasoning

Arithmetic first served trade, agriculture, and construction, helping societies measure land, track goods, and calculate taxes. The spread of the Hindu-Arabic numeral system (digits 0–9) revolutionized arithmetic, replacing cumbersome Roman numerals. Arithmetic started with simple counting tools in prehistoric times, evolved through ancient numeral systems in Mesopotamia, Egypt, India, and China, was formalized by Greek thinkers, and transformed with the Hindu-Arabic numeral system into the universal foundation of mathematics we use today.

What are the Core Components of Arithmetic?

The basic components of arithmetic are the fundamental operations with numbers: addition, subtraction, multiplication, division, and sometimes extended operations like powers and roots. These are the building blocks of all other mathematics and the backbone of mathematics and everyday problem-solving.

ARITHMETIC (CONT.)

How Does Arithmetic Provide Foundations For Higher Mathematics?

Arithmetic is the foundation of mathematics, and it naturally leads to higher branches such as algebra, geometry, trigonometry, calculus, number theory, probability, and statistics. Without arithmetic, these advanced fields could not exist because they all rely on the basic operations of numbers (Example: From 2+3=52+3=5 in arithmetic to solving x+3=5x+3=5 in algebra.)

- **Geometry** → Uses arithmetic to measure shapes, lengths, areas, and volumes. (Example: Calculating the area of a rectangle length times width).
- **Algebra** → Builds on arithmetic by introducing symbols (like xx, yy) to represent numbers and generalize
- **Trigonometry** → Extends arithmetic into the study of angles and triangles. (Example: Using ratios like sine, cosine, and tangent, which are built on division and multiplication.)
- •Calculus → Explores change and motion, relying on limits, derivatives, and integrals. (Example: From simple slopes in arithmetic to instantaneous rates of change.
- **Number Theory** → Deepens arithmetic by studying properties of integers, primes, and divisibility. (Example: Investigating prime numbers, modular arithmetic, and cryptography
- **Probability & Statistics** → Applies arithmetic to analyze chance, data, and uncertainty. Example: Calculating averages, percentages, and probabilities.

Arithmetic leads directly into algebra, geometry, trigonometry, calculus, number theory, probability, and statistics, forming the stepping stones to both pure and applied mathematics.

What is the Use of Arithmetic and Resultant Higher Mathematics in Everyday Life?

Arithmetic and higher mathematics are useful in everyday life because they help people make better decisions, manage money, solve problems, and understand the world around them. From simple tasks like grocery shopping to complex ones like analyzing data or using technology, math is constantly at work behind the scenes.

Everyday Uses of Higher Mathematics

- **Algebra**: Helps solve problems with unknowns, like figuring out how many hours of work are needed to reach a savings goal.
- **Geometry**: Used in home improvement, design, and navigation (measuring spaces, angles, and distances).
- Statistics & Probability: Essential for interpreting data, understanding risks, and making predictions—whether in sports, weather forecasts, or medical decisions. The importance of Statistical and Probability Analysis cannot be overstated. These two higher areas of mathematics are used throughout financial analysis and all areas of business. A manager of a small business operation needs to understand the use of statistics and probabilities if he wants to stay in business.
- **Calculus**: Though less visible, it underpins modern technology, from smartphone graphics to predicting changes in markets or populations.
- **Computational Thinking**: Algorithms (mathematical recipes) drive apps, websites, and Al systems we use daily

Together, they are not just academic subjects but **practical life skills** that shape financial stability, problem-solving ability, and technological literacy.

THE LIBERAL ART/SCIENCE OF ASTRONOMY OCCUPY SPACE

On December 4th, 1998, Space Shuttle Endeavour lifted off carrying some very special cargo: Unity, the first U.S.-built module of what would become the International Space Station. Two days later, NASA astronaut Nancy Currie skillfully maneuvered the shuttle's Canadarm to capture Russia's already-orbiting Zarya module. Eight days and three spacewalks after launch, Endeavour undocked—leaving behind a pair of connected

modules and the first heartbeat of the ISS.

Over the next three years, the station slowly took shape as new components arrived: science labs, living quarters, trusses, and the massive double-sided solar arrays that now define its silhouette. On November 2nd, 2000, a Russian Soyuz delivered Expedition 1—three astronauts who stepped inside the ISS and marked the beginning of continuous human presence in space. As of this year, humanity has lived off-world for 25 straight years.

Contributions from the Japanese Space Agency (JAXA), the

Canadian Space Agency (CSA), the European Space Agency (ESA), and private industry have expanded the ISS into a truly global endeavor. One of the more unusual additions is the Bigelow Expandable Activity Module (BEAM), an experimental inflatable habitat. Originally designed for a two-year test, BEAM has now served nearly a decade, proving its durability while offering extra storage and insight into how we might live on the Moon or Mars. Eight docking ports now allow crewed and automated spacecraft to come and go with supplies, experiments, and new inhabitants.

Today's ISS spans nearly the area of a football field—though much of that footprint comes from its enormous

solar arrays. The panels gather sunlight directly and also harvest light reflected from Earth below. Inside, the station holds 35.491 cubic feet of pressurized volume, though almost two-thirds of it houses equipment, lifesupport systems, and storage. After a quarter century of upgrades, experiments, and expansions, the interior has become a labyrinth of cables and conduits—20thcentury hardware woven into 21st-century technology.



Occupy Space (Cont.)



And like all aging spacecraft, the ISS is feeling the strain. Without the luxury of a trip to the mechanic, astronauts work constantly to keep the station healthy. But time has brought cracks, air leaks, computer glitches, and the occasional micrometeoroid impact. Originally designed for a 15-year mission, the ISS is expected to be retired and de-orbited over Point Nemo—the most remote place on Earth—sometime around 2030, having served twice its planned lifetime.

For now, though, our orbital outpost remains one of the brightest manmade objects in the night sky. At 260 miles up, its sprawling solar arrays reflect sunlight beautifully during the twilight hours. You can find sighting opportunities at nasa.gov/spot-the-station. Passes usually last 3–5 minutes, and you won't need binoculars or a telescope—just step outside after sunset or before sunrise and watch for a brilliant, fast-moving light with no blinking aircraft markers. As we prepare to hand low-Earth orbit over to commercial space stations, take a moment this month to look up. That bright streak racing overhead at 17,500 mph represents 25 years of cooperation, perseverance, and human ingenuity—proof that we truly can learn to occupy space.


